

These three flowers are symbolic of England Ireland, and Scotland.





MASONIC PHILATELIC SOCIETY.

The President, Mr. W. H. Pethard presided over a record attendance at the August meeting. Nine new members were elected and those present for the first time were warmly welcomed by the President. Mr. M. Kohane, who has recently returned from a business trip abroad, gave a short but interesting account of his experiences overseas, and conveyed to the meeting greetings from the New York Masonic Philatelic Society, and referred to the right royal welcome which he received from the members of this Society and others of the fraternity. His experience in London was one of great delight and the warm-hearted and friendly treatment which he received from the folk of "Old England" will long be remembered by him. Mr. Kohane kindly donated a number of stamps, and F.D. covers to the Society and these were sold, the funds benefiting by over f1. The syllabus item for the evening was a sale by tender and, after very keen competition, 87 lots changed hands, the amount realised being over f53. Over 100 exchanges sheets were handed in by members, but time did not permit of their being passed round. MASONRY ON POSTAGE STAMPS

One of the most interesting postage stamps from the standpoint of the Masonic story behind it is the 7¢ stamp now in use. It bears the portrait of Andrew Jackson. The story it tells is that of the triumph of Freemasonry over its enemies.

In 1826, occurred what has become known as the "Morgan incident." William Morgan, incensed against certain Masons, threatened to publish the secrets of Freemasonry which he said had come into his possession. He was kidnapped from a jail where he had been imprisoned for larceny and disappeared mysteriously. Masons were blamed for this disappearance.

The enemies of Freemasonry seized upon this incident to carry on a fanatical campaign. Masons were removed from positions of trust. Attempts were made to deprive Masonic bodies of their chartered rights and to prevent their meetings.

This wave, started on the East coast, swept over the country. Masonic lodges suspended operations and eventually Grand Lodges fell victims. Established Masonry disappeared in many states. In Illinois, the Grand Lodge passed out of existence.

The Anti-Masonic Party, as it was called, came into political power in many sections of the country. To acknowledge membership in the Fraternity was often political suicide.

Andrew Jackson, a Past Grand Master of Tennessee, was President in the midst of this controversy. He stood steadfast, nevertheless, and refused to bow to the fanatics. In consequence, when he ran for re-election in 1832, the Anti-Masonic Party put up an opposition candidate by the name of William Wirt.

The election was a hotly contested one. The issue was Freemasonry. Upon the results hinged the future of the nation. When the results were tabulated, Jackson's electoral votes totaled 219. Wirt received seven votes, those of Vermont. Other candidates obtained 62. President Jackson's popular vote exceeded that on his first election.

That marked the beginning of the end of the Anti-Masonic Party. Its power began to crumble and eventually it died out altogether. On the other hand, Masonry came back stronged than ever, going on to greater glory.

So, when the next time you see a 7¢ postage stamp, take a good look at it. Read in that stern, wrinkled face of Andrew Jackson the story of the triumph of Freemasonry over its enemies.


