

## MASONIC SYMBOLISMS ON ABYSSINAN STAMPS

Several Abyssinian (Ethiopian) stamps provide Masonic symbolisms. The Throne of King Solomon is shown on a 1931 series (Nos. 210-216) and on three stamps of 1909 (Nos. 87-89). The Lion of the Tribe of Judah is shown as the central figure on numerous issues prior to 1909 but it is particularly prominent on a 10c issue of 1947 (No. 273). The Lion of Judah statue is shown on a 30c issue of 1950 (No. 305).

### MASONIC SIGNIFICANCE BEHIND VALLEY FORGE STAMP

The Masonic significance behind the 2c Valley Forge stamp of 1928 (No. 645) was no accident. The stamp shows George Washington, a Mason kneeling in prayer and bears the motto: "In God We Trust." The design was chosen by Br. Robert S. Regar, then with the post office department and who served as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia in 1935.

#### AUSTRIAN STAMP PICTURES NOTED DOCTOR-MASON

Gerhard van Swieten (1700-1772), Dutch-born physician shown on an Austrian stamp (No. B156) a 5g plus 5g issue of 1937, was a Mason, Dr. van Swieten was called to Vienna University in 1745. He fought against superstition in medicine and helped to modernize the professions. He served as physician to Queen Maria Theresa.

#### GENERAL DOMINGO FRENCH (1783-1825)

This military leader was actively engaged in the freedom movement for Argentina. He and Col. Beruti organized a secret society of youth who wore, for identification, rosettes of white and blue ribbon. He served in the war for independence in which he was part of the siege of Montevideo in 1814 and in Peru in 1815.

His likeness appears on Argentina Scott Nos. 166 and 475.







