MASONIC STAMP CLUB OF NEW YORK

Masonic Clubs have been formed and chartered to bring Masons together, and to offer the members the means of becoming better acquainted with one another. Having the same ideas and hobbies makes it easier to spread the cement of Brotherly Love with Masons who share the same interests. These Masonic clubs include Veterans who have served in the armed forces, Luncheon Clubs, High Twelve International, Court House Square Club, etc. This is where businessmen, Lawyers, Doctors, Postal workers, and retired persons get together for lunch and talk about Lodge and Free Masonry in general. We also have Lawyers Clubs, and engineers. firemen, Marines, and Police Square Clubs. Masons who are of Scottish decent formed the Kilties of New Jersey. Members of some clubs are proficient in the ritual. They form degree teams and are invited to different Lodges to put on a degree or a different lodge program promoting good fellowship. A famous club in the early 1920's was the 233 Club. This organization consisted of members of Pacific Lodge #233, New York City who were employed in the entertainment field. They traveled to Hollywood, California where the film industry was growing rapidly. There the entertainers got together and formed this Club. If those of us who are over the age of 55 were to read off the names on the roster, we would recognize them instantly. Our fellow Masons appeared in the Silent Films of the 20's to the talkies in the 30's, to today's television, from Brothers Douglas Fairbanks, Sr. to Peter Sellers and Ernest Borgnine.

The Masonic Stamp Club of New York is no exception. In the Grand Lodge Library and Museum at 71 West 23rd Street in New York City several Masons, just like the other Masonic clubs mentioned before, all had the same hobby or interest. They were stamp collectors. On the 30th of January, 1934, the chairman who presided over this group was M. W. Charles H. Johnson, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New York from 1930 to 1931. He was well known in Philatelic circles as well as in Freemasonery, M. W. Johnson went on to be Grand Lodge Secretary of the Grand Lodge of New York from 1932 to 1946. So you see, the Masonic Stamp Club of New York was in good hands and off to a great start. Most of the meetings were for talks on stamps and stamp collecting. At one of the meetings in 1938, the Masonic Stamp Club of New York petitioned Brother and club member Franklin D. Roosevelt to issue a commemorative stamp in honor of the 150th aniversary of the inauguration of Brother George Washington, another Mason and 1st President of the United States. Brother Roosevelt, an avid stamp collector himself, was President of the United States at the time. The following year, on April 30, 1939, this Stamp was issued. The Masonic Stamp Club prepared a special First Day Cover for the occasion. These covers were mailed to Masons all over the world for the sum of ten cents each, with the proceeds from the Sale of the covers going to the George Washington Shrine at Tappan, New York.

The Masonic Stamp Club has always encouraged research and study of Masonic Philately, which promotes good fellowship among Masons. The membership is now well over 700 including Masons from all over the world.

Forty-three years later at the 225th anniversary of St. John's Lodge Number 1, New York City, on December 7, 1982, this writer, along with George Wettach the present High Priest of Fideity #49 Chapter Royal Arch Masons New Jersey produced a cover commemorating the event. We purchased 200 stamps which originately sold for 3¢ in 1932. We paid fifty cents a piece to a stamp dealer and were glad to locate them, because it put the final touch to a beautiful anniversary catchet. Besides, the enjoyment of stamp collecting, it can be profitable. All the proceeds-\$200-were donated to St. John's Lodge for the preservation of the Famous George Washington Bible which St. John's Lodge Ancient York Masons are the proud possessors of.

The Masonic Stamp Club outgrew various meeting rooms at the Masonic hall on 23rd Street in New York City. In 1944 the club moved to the collectors club on West 35th Street just off 5th Ave., in the fashionable Murray Hill section of Manhattan. The Collectors Club building was designated a New York landmark on September 11, 1979. The site won its place in history 200 years earlier as the estate of Robert and Mary Murrry where General Howe was detained, allowing General George Washington to proceed further northward, changing the outcome of the American Revolution. The building itself was constructed in 1901 and was the work of Stanford White, a leading architect at the turn of the century. It was purchased by the Collectors Club in 1936, and is an ideal place to meet, as many members of the Masonic Stamp Club are also members of the Collectors Club. After lunch at the Charlton Gardens, in B. Altman, the meetings start at 2:00 P.M., the second Wednesday each month except July and August.

In the early 1940s members of Masonic Stamp Club started serious study of Masons on postage stamps and the term Masonic philately was born. In March of 1944 a small publication was produced with the title of the Masonic Philatelist. This has grown to a quarterly publication now in its 41st volume edited by Dr. Irwin M. Yarry and published by Dr. Allan Boudreau. Through the year dozens of First Day Cachets honoring Masons and Masonic events have also been produced and sold to support charitable activities. One of the Highlights of the year is when the Philately Degree is presented and all members are welcome to enjoy this fun night.

When I go to New York to attend Lodge, I get to the Masonic Hall early so I could spend a few hours examining the remarkable displays in the Grand Lodge Library and Museum and using the research facilities. The fascinating exhibit of Masonic first day covers and other philatelic items led to my starting my own Masonic cover collection. The addition of new covers from time to time is expanding both my philatelic and my Masonic knowledge. I recommend that all Brothers consider suggesting an approprate commemorative cover for a significant anniversary of their Lodges. They make nice philatelic souvenirs that can be admired for years to come.





SOME GENERAL GUIDELINES

Now that membership has been widened to include members of other Regular Constitutions, I feel that perhaps a note on what members can expect at the present time, would not be amiss.

Many Constitutions are more relaxed than others in their attitudes, so in order to be fair and keep our respectability, I intend to maintain our policy of trying to interest our members through the Newsletters.

All other areas of the hobby, such as producing covers, accepting advertisements from others who produce covers, etc., will not be considered, even if the entire proceeds are to be donated to Charity and the revenue from advertisements a boost to Club funds.

Any activity which may be misconstrued as being commercial or advertising Freemasonry, will not be considered, and stamp dealers in Masonic material will not be encouraged to become members.

News of happenings in areas related to our hobby will continue to be reported in our Newsletters. This may include news of Covers available, if space permits, from time to time. but these will be News items and not paid advertisements. As a service to our members, for a S.A.E. or international reply coupon, I am willing to supply the names and addresses of any one, member or not, who may be able to help an individual with his particular needs, and members who wish to exchange stamps and covers or have particular requirements will be listed, space permitting, but I cannot list members "for sale" items openly, in case the idea that certain members are using the Club for personal gain is given. This would bring the Club as a whole in to question, when the majority of members are only interested in our hobby, through their love of Masonry and stamps.

Any correspondence between members of various Constitutions must be related to Philatelic matters rather than Masonic.







SPECIALTY COLLECTING

Specialty collecting hasn't anything to do with the subject matter of the stamps you collect. (Collecting stamps that have a particular subject is called **topical** collecting.) A specialty collection is a particular form of stamps, such as:

Blocks of Four A square block of four unused (mint), unseparated stamps, with two stamps above and two below. A block can come from anywhere on a sheet of stamps. This is the easiest block to collect.

Plate Blocks Usually plate blocks are four corner stamps with the printing plate number in the margin (selvage) of the sheet. On January 1, 1981, the Postal Service started a new plate number system. Each color plate first used in the production of a stamp is represented by a number 1 in the group of numbers in the margin. Whenever a plate is worn out and replaced during the printing process, a number 2 replaces the number 1. The color of the number is the same as the color of the plate it stands for.

Copyright Blocks The U.S. Postal Service now copyrights all new stamp designs. The copyright C in a circle, followed by "United States Postal Service" or "USPS" and the year, appears in the margin of each sheet of stamps. The first copyright notice appeared January 6, 1978, in the margin of sheets of the Carl Sandburg stamp. Most copyrights are collected in blocks of four.

Booklet Panes Stamp booklets were first issued in 1898. Usually six or more of the same stamps are on a page, called a pane. Several pages of stamps are stapled in a cover. Most collections are of an entire pane.

Covers Covers (envelopes) stamped and postmarked with the date of the stamp's first day of issue are collected by a large number of people. On page 12 you'll find more information about first day covers and how to order them.

Souvenir Cards These 6" x 8" cards are issued as souvenirs of the philatelic (stamp collecting) events. They are distributed by the United States Postal Service, or the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. Some are available cancelled. They cannot be used for postage. Of special interest to American stamp collectors is the annual souvenir card for National Stamp Collecting Month each October, first issued in 1981.

Mr. ZIP Blocks The Zoning Improvement Plan—better known as ZIP Code—helps the Postal Service handle and deliver mail quickly. A Mr. ZIP cartoon and slogan were first printed on the Sam Houston stamp of 1964. Mr. ZIP blocks have become quite popular with collectors.



FIRST DAY COVERS

A first day cover is an envelope that has a new stamp cancelled with the date of the first day it was issued. For each new postal stamp or stationery issue, the Postal Service names one post office that is related in some way to the subject of the stamp. Each first day cover is cancelled at the post office that conducts the first day ceremonies.

Here's how you can get a first day cover through the Postal Service. You will get faster service if you buy the stamp yourself, and then send it to the first day post office for cancellation. When a new stamp goes on sale at your post office (usually the next day after the first day of issue), you can buy one and put it on your own envelope. Put the address in the lower right-hand corner. Leave plenty of room for the stamp and the cancellation. You can use a peelable address label if you don't want the address to remain on the envelope. Put your first day envelope inside another envelope. Mail it to "Customer Affixed Envelopes" in care of the postmaster of the first day city. The post office will cancel your envelope and return it to you through the mail. You may do this for 30 days after the issue date of the stamp.

Or, you can send an envelope addressed to yourself, but without a stamp. Put the addressed envelope into another envelope. Address the outside envelope to the name of the stamp, in care of the postmaster of the first day city. You must also include payment for the stamp or stamps that are to be put on your envelope. Do not send cash. You may send a check, a bank draft, or a U.S. Postal money order. Make it out to the U.S. Postal Service.

Do not send requests more than 60 days prior to the issue date. Usually you will receive your cancelled cover within three weeks after the first day of issue. If you don't, write to the postmaster of the first day city. Tell how the envelope was addressed, what kind of design or cachet it had, and how many stamps were ordered. If you ever get a first day cover that is damaged, send it back to the postmaster. A new one will be sent to you.


The U.S. Postal Service tries to get the first day covers into the mail just as soon as possible. To do this, it sends a special team of workers to a first day post office. Their job is just to work on first day covers. Of course, they can't do all that work on one day. Often it takes weeks. When there's an especially popular stamp issue, it may take even longer than usual to get all the first day covers out. For example, for the 1982 State Birds and Flowers issue 12,070,206 first day covers were cancelled.
















MONEY MAKES THE MARE GO!!!

There is an old saying that "Money makes the mare go." Money also makes other things go. To be specific, it makes the Masonic Stamp Club of New York go. A Club, like any other undertaking, cannot be successful unless it is supplied with sufficient funds for carrying on its activities. Our Club is not a business venture. It is not organized for profit and no member is paid for his labors in carrying out the activities of the Club, but our Club does have a business side which is of the utmost importance.

Perhaps the average Club member thinks that the financing of the organization is a simple problem; he gives it no study and is not really concerned about it. Once a year he receives a statement of his dues and, sooner or later, he sends in his check.

With the officers it is a different matter. Printing and mailing the MASONIC PHILATELIST to over 600 members on a regular quarterly basis is a major Club activity. Printing costs have risen dramatically over the past few years. Postage has increased from 3¢ an ounce when the Club was first organized to the present first class rate of 22¢ an ounce, with the prospect of even higher rates in the near future.

Other expenses have increased but, fortunately, none at such a rate. Paper, envelopes, typewriter ribbons, typewriter repairs, stationery, and other items add to the ongoing expenses of operating our Club. The cost of actually printing the MASONIC PHILATELIST is over \$1.00 for each copy. When we look back to the time Al Van Dahl printed our MASONIC PHILATELIST as his contribution to the Club and Club only paid for the cost of the postage we realize how sweet it was.
