


WOODMEN OF THE WORLD



Many of us have encountered covers like the ones illustrated in our search for Masonic related materials. Sometimes, we find that dealers have misidentified these items as Masonic and priced them accordingly.

The Woodmen of the World are three fraternal organizations, that descend from the "Modern Woodman" of Rock Island, IL [which continues to operate]. The Woodman, established about 1870, was a fraternal benefit society providing low-cost burial insurance to Civil War veterans. About 1890, Woodman of Omaha and Pacific Woodman split from the parent organization. Woodman of Omaha, covering much of the Midwest, remains in business as one of the larger insurance companies. Pacific Woodman is based in Littleton, CO, and covers the western rim states. Outside of Colorado it is known under the name "Insured Investors Life."

The local organizations are chapters in the larger cities, with many social activities.






The Tireless President

In November 1995 a new United States Postage Stamp was issued to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the birth of James L. Polk, eleventh President of the United States. The facsimile shown to the left is from the Internet Home-page on the United States Postal Service. The accompanying article for the stamp shows the following information relative to the stamp design.

"The stamp, designed by John Thompson of Waterloo, Iowa, features an engraved portrait of Polk surrounded by an ornate oval frame replicating the nineteenth-century style typical of early postage stamps."

Polk's numerous accomplishments in the presidency distinguish him as a highly ambitious, goal-directed individual. It was these qualities that both led him to his success and, unfortunately, to his untimely demise [President Polk virtually worked himself to death. He died 103 days after completing his term of office.

James Polk was a member of Columbia Lodge No. 31, Columbia, Tennessee. Aside from the stamps that depict this famous Freemason, there

are a number of other stamps with unique connections that might be considered in a Masonic presentation.

These stamps are those associated with some of the milestones, as follows, of Polk's administration.

- Opening of the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, 1845 (Reference: Scott No. 794).
- Establishment of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C. 1846 (Reference Scott No. 943).
- Issuance of the first United States Postage Stamp, 1847 (Reference: Scott No. 1).
- Laying the cornerstone of the Washington Monument, 1848 (Reference: Scott No. 1157).

There is yet another, although somewhat unusual, postage stamp connection with President Polk. The three stars on Tennessee's State Flag (Scott No. 1648) are said to represent Presidents Andrew Jackson, James Polk and Andrew Johnson, who all lived in Tennessee and, incidentally, who were all Freemasons.

James Knox Polk, the eleventh president of the United States, was sworn into office in 1845 following his election as the nation's first "dark horse" candidate. Polk was born in Pineville, North Carolina on November 2, 1795 and moved with his family to Tennessee at an early age. He graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1818 and returned to Tennessee where he studied law and served as a clerk of the state senate in Murfreesboro, then the state capitol.

Polk served seven terms in the United States Congress as a supporter and friend of Andrew Jackson, and served as speaker of the United States House of Representatives between a835 and a839, leaving to become Governor of Tennessee. Polk remains the only Speaker of the House to become president.

In 1844, Polk was a leading contender for the Democratic nomination for vice-president, behind a strong list of presidential contenders including martin Van Buren of New York, John Calhoun of South Carolina, Lewis Cass of Michigan, and James Buchanan of Pennsylvania. After the presidential nomination remained deadlocked after eight ballots, the Democrats at the convention agreed on a compromise candidate, Silas Wright of New York with Polk as his running mate. Wright, however, refused the nomination and Polk, whose name was not even on the first seven ballots, was nominated unanimously on the ninth ballot.

In the presidential election that followed, Polk garnered 107 electoral votes to 105 for the Whig candidate Henry Clay of Kentucky, giving Polk the slimmest margin of victory up to that date.

Committed to the nation's "manifest Destiny," Polk won a war with Mexico and annexed more than 500,000 square miles now known as Texas, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. At the same time, Polk risked war with Great Britain, claiming the territory from the California border northward to the southern boundary of Russian Alaska, located at latitude 54 degrees 40 minutes north. Although extremists demanded "fifty four forty or fight," Polk worked out a treaty with Great Britain establishing the northern boundary of the Pacific northwest at the 49th parallel, with the exception of the southern end of Vancouver Island.

James Knox Polk died on June 15, 1849, in Nashville, Tennessee, 103 days after completing his term of office as President of the United States.

THE JAMES K. POLK ANCESTRAL HOME & THE JAMES K. POLK MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION


The Ancestral Home of James Knox Polk, located in historic Maury County, Tenn., is the only house still in existence (other than the White House) in which Polk actually lived. It was there Polk lived while he began his legal and political career.

The home has been restored to the period 1820-1850 and is furnished with objects that belonged to or relate to President and Mrs. Polk, the immediate family, or the Polk presidency. The 1816 Federal-style building, built by the president's parents, is a Registered National Historic Landmark and attracts thousands of visitors annually.

The recently renovated "Sisters' House" next door, where two of Polk's married sisters lived at different times, is the starting point for tours of the site and contains the museum which illustrates Polk's career and accomplishments, the video room where visitors watch a twelve-minute orientation film, the museum shop and all administrative offices. Included in the tour are the reconstructed kitchen behind the home and the large formal garden.

The preservation of the Polk home and artifacts is the result of efforts on city, county and state levels. When Polk's widow, Sarah Childress Polk, died in Nashville in 1891, her great-niece, Mrs. Rollin P. Grant, inherited many of the president's belongings and initiated efforts to collect, save and display the Polk possessions. She organized the Polk Memorial Association in 1924.

In 1929, the organization decided to acquire the Polk Home and move the collection to Columbia. Over a period of almost twenty years, additional property was purchased to create the current one-acre site. The Association relies heavily on the volunteer efforts of its 1,200 members in every aspect of its operation, including a variety of educational programs.

THE YORKTOWN "STAND-IN"

On a blustery day in 1781, a British officer was ordered to "stand-in" for his commander in the negotiations for the surrender of Yorktown. The commander, Charles Comwallis, said he was too ill to attend. On the American side, George Washington made an appropriate response by sending one of his generals, Benjamin Lincoln, to accept the surrender.

This story is well known, and the whole event is recorded on one of the spectacular American Bicentennial souvenir sheets (Scott No. 1686). What is not well known, however, is the identity and history of the British officer who replaced Cornwallis on that memorable day.

Strange as it may seem, this officer was selected as the subject on a 13 cent U.S. stamp (Scott No. 1686a) that is part of the souvenir sheet. Why is this strange? Well, here we have a valid U.S. postage stamp depicting a historical person about whom few people know any information.


To set the record straight, the officer's name was Charles O'Hara (1740-1802). When he was 26 years old, he entered the Coldstream Guards, England, of which his father, James O'Hara, was a colonel.

Charles was aide to Major General John Granby in 1759 and was himself promoted to quartermaster general in Portugal in 1762. O'Hara commanded the troops in action at Goree in Senegal in 1766, and in 1781 served under General Comwallis in America. O'Hara saw action in the Carolina campaign and was wounded at Guilford.

After the surrender at Yorktown, O'Hara was exchanged and became major general in 1782, and lieutenant general in 1783. Serving in France, at Toulon, in 1793, he was again wounded, captured and exchanged two years later. He became the governor of Gibraltar in 1795 and remained in that capacity until his death in 1802.

With regard to O'Hara's personal life, the history books say: "He was for some years engaged to marry Horace Walpole's young friend Mary Berry, who called him, 'the most perfect specimen of a soldier and courtier of the past age,' but apparently (she) decided not to marry perfection."

Was O'Hara a Freemason? This information has not come to light. We are reasonably sure his commanding officer, Charles Comwallis, was a Mason, so it would not be surprising to learn of O'Hara's membership. Perhaps one of our British members would like to take up the challenge and do a little digging. Whatever the results, we now at least have an identity for the subject of Scott No. 1686a.







1997 ROSE PARADE MASONIC FLOAT

In our continuing effort to present the FAMILY OF FREEMASONRY to the public and generate interest in the fraternity, the Float Committee has again been authorized to enter a float in the 1997 ROSE PARADE.

The FAMILY OF FREEMASONRY floats have been receiving more attention in the last two Parades. Three live television interviews were held at the floats, the 1996 float (Humpty Dumpty) was featured as the selected float for the news lead on prime-time television and an Associated Press article identified this float as one of the four greatest crowd pleasers in the Parade.

The theme of the 1997 Parade is "LIFE'S SHINING MOMENTS". Our float will be titled "FOLLOW YOUR RAINBOW" and will feature a large rainbow stretching the entire length of the float from a storm cloud in the back to a pot of gold in the front. The float will recognize the 75th anniversary of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls and the 100th anniversary of the Order of the Amaranth. Details of the float design and the organizations celebrating these anniversaries are described in the enclosed fiver.

The pay-off from the float program is difficult to determine. However, its primary purpose is to expose the principles of Freemasonry and its organization to the public in a manner that will attract future members. We have continued to emphasize the charitable work of the fraternity, its role in shaping democracy, its history, the many organizations which comprise the Family of Freemasonry and its youth organizations.

The cost of the 1997 float is approximately \$90,000, and is covered by donations from Grand Lodges, Lodges, individual members, and concordant and appendant organizations throughout North America. Memorabilia and videotapes of previous floats are available for promotion and educational purposes.

The Rose Parade provides the most economical method of reaching a potential worldwide audience of more than 450 million people in 90 countries. We invite you to participate in this outstanding annual opportunity to make Freemasonry more visible in the community, to dispel the myths about Freemasonry and to attract good people to the FAMILY OF FREEMASONRY.

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"FOLLOW YOUR RAINBOW" INSPIRES 1997 FAMILY OF FREEMASONRY FLOAT



Rainbow Girls, Amaranth to be Honored in Parade

With the inspirational title of "Follow Your Rainbow," the Family of Freemasonry will again sponsor a float in the Tournament of Roses Parade on New Year's Day, it has been announced by Charles H. Alexander, Grand Master of Masons in California.

Honoring two Masonic organizations, the International Order of Rainbow for Girls and the Order of Amaranth, the fraternity's colorful entry in the Jan. 1 event in Pasadena will be ablaze with flowers in a high-arching rainbow from stem to stern.

For Rainbow for Girls, the float observes their 75th anniversary, while Amaranth is singled out for its 100th birthday, according to Stanley Channon, the Masonic float committee chairman and himself a Past Grand Master.

"These two organizations are at the heart and soul of Freemasonry, so we feel it is very appropriate to honor them, particularly since they tie in so well with the parade theme," said Channon.

That theme, "Life's Shining Moments," will be depicted on the Masonic float with a full-color rainbow crowning a mass of storm clouds to represent a shining moment of nature.

From the rear of the entry, the rainbow will arch across a bed of thousands of flowers, culminating in a large pot of gold at the front.

The distinctive design by Phoenix Decorating Co. will produce rays of sunshine to penetrate the clouds and reach down to the base on each side of the 40-foot float.

And to accent the storm clouds, special effects will create lightning, thunder and

falling raindrops, appearing to emenate from beneath the rainbow.

"It should be one of our most exciting floats." said Channon.

While the abundance of live flowers, as required by Pasadena's Tournament Or Roses organization, will create a panorama of color, the float will take on added beauty with the presence of eight young women from the Family of Freemasonry.

In fact, the Amaranth representative, dressed in cap and gown and standing in the center of the float, beneath the rainbow, depicts a shining moment in life — college graduation.

Amaranth provides scholarships to worthy students and also supports the Diabetes Foundation.

On the float the student will be holding a certificate of graduation from the University of California, which she will obtain with the aid of an Amaranth scholarship.

Surrounding the flower-bedecked entry as it moves down Colorado Blvd. to be viewed by an international television audience and more than one million spectators along the parade route will be seven members of the Order of Rainbow.

They will be dressed in pastel formals to complement the central theme of the float.

All told, nearly a half-billion people in 90 countries will watch the parade and receive favorable impressions of float sponsors.

"That, of course, is the major reason we continue to sponsor entries in this gala celebration of the new year. But, at the same time, we get a great deal of enjoyment ourselves as hundreds of our

Thousands of Flowers Will Create Colorful 1997 Float

No float in the 1997 Tournament of Roses parade will be more colorful than the entry produced by the Family of Freemasonry, predicts float committee chairman Stan Channon.

"What could be more colorful than a rainbow?," he questioned.

The rainbow, representing one of life's shining moments, will be created with a combination of red carnations, orange calengua, yellow mums, green belies of Ireland, blue iris and blue and purple statice.

The pot at the end of the rainbow will be decorated with yellow and gold roses, sesame seeds and rustic coloring, with the jewels around the pot consisting of fresh carnation petals.

Coins, spilling out of the pot, will be made of straw flowers and sesame seed, while the entire float will be embellished with stringed flowers, including luneria and baby's breath.

Sun, storm and lightning will create a dramatic effect for the float as it travels through Pasadena. Sound effects will produce thunder, and simulated raindrops falling from the rainbow and the lightning burst will provide an interesting counterpoint for what is expected to be a sunny day in Southern California.

Finally, the rays of sunshine, breaking through the clouds on the beautiful float, will come to life through the use of various colored roses, red carnations and iris.

Masonic youth unite to decorate the float. And we feel a real sense of pride in creating visibility for this wonderful fraternity," added Channon.

Nearly three million Masons comprise the world's oldest and largest fraternity, with countless accordant bodies contributing more than \$1.5 million daily for charitable causes, particularly children.

Many of these organizations, including the Shrine, Scottish Rite, York Rite, Eastern Star, DeMolay, Job's Daughters, High Twelve and the two organizations honored on the float contribute to its sponsorship.
