# Masonic Post Cards Macoy Publishing Company New York

There have been numerous articles on the enjoyment in collecting Masonic postcards. There is a good reason for this. There are so many facets to this field that everyone can find cards of interest. One is able to collect cards picturing Masonic temples, Scottish Rite Cathedrals, Shrine Mosques, Masonic Homes and Hospitals, etc. Magnificent edifices to small, one-room buildings will be found.

In addition to buildings there are many other categories, such as Masonic humorous cards, famous Masons pictured on cards, or cards printed by the Masonic Service Association during WWII. These cards showed rooms in Masonic Temples that offered rest and recreation to service men and women during the war. There are cards showing meals being served, others show Ping-Pong and pool tables and writing desks, etc.

Then, there is one group that I find to be fascinating. This group gets very little attention because the cards are so scarce and hard to find. I am speaking of cards printed by the Macoy Publishing Company of New York from 1898 to 1913. Macoy covered all phases of Masonry from buildings such as the New York City and Philadelphia Pennsylvania Temples (incidentally both by the same Architect, Napoleon le Brun) and the Masonic Home in Utica, New York. There are also humorous cards, to cards of Shriners, Scottish Rite, and Knights Templar, to cards of the Order of the Eastern Star, to cards of individuals and cards of Masonic aprons. You will also find cards picturing degree work and the Landmarks of Freemasonry.

These cards are either in black and white or gravure. Some of the cards are crudely drawn while others are magnificently engraved. The engravings are extremely clear and sharp. They are truly works of art.

To my knowledge Macoy Masonic Publishing Company produced a total of eighty Masonic postcards. To indicate how scarce they are, in my twenty five years of collecting Masonic postcards, I have only been able to obtain thirty-eight of them, not even half of the total, I shall continue to search for the missing cards as it is always a thrill to see one that I do not have.

Shown on the following pages are examples of the various categories of Macoy cards. As I have said, Macoy covered an phases of Masonry. At one time, I did not know whether they were or not, but I believed the Macoy publishers had to be brother Masons.

I needed an answer to this question and my research took me to *Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia* published by the Macoy Publishing and Masonic Supply Company Incorporated in 1961 and the comprehensive entry regarding Robert Macoy (1815-1895). Robert Macoy was a prominent American Freemason, publisher, writer and ritualist. Macoy spent his life in the printing business and in Masonic activities in New York City. In 1849, he started a Masonic supply and publishing business which, under the name Macoy Publishing and Masonic Supply Company, is still in active operation.

Macoy wrote innumerable articles for Masonic Magazines and he wrote or helped to write a number of books. He first published *The Masonic Manual* in 1852. His "MASONIC MANUAL, A pocket Companion for the Initiated: CONTAINING THE RITUALS OF FREEMASONRY EMBRACED IN THE


DEGREES OF THE LODGE CHAPTER AND ENCAMPMENT; EMBELLISHED WITH Upwards of Three Hundred Engravings. TOGETHER WITH FORMS OF MASONIC DOCUMENTS, NOTES, SONGS, DATES, ETC. Compiled and arranged BY ROBERT MACOY PAST MASTER, PAST GRAND SECRETARY, PAST GRAND COMMANDER, GRAND, RECORDER, ETC, REVISED, EDITION, New York" may well have been the most popular Masonic Monitor ever produced.

The term, "The Real Macoy" is said to have been a frequent reference to a Masonic Monitor or ritual book published by Macoy when compared to one of the less regarded Masonic monitors and ritual books then published throughout the world. Macoy also reorganized Adoptive Masonry into Chapters and his ritual of *THE ADOPTIVE RITE*, published in 1868, remains the standard from which all Eastern Star rituals are taken today. His last book, *the Amaranth Ritual* was published posthumously in 1895.

The computer website for Macoy (macoy.com) states, "Macoy Publishing and Masonic Supply Co., Inc. has been serving FreeMasonry since 1849. Macoy is the oldest Masonic literature publishing firm in the United States. No other Masonic supply house has had such a continuous record. Macoy takes pride in offering quality items and services to Freemasons everywhere. We offer an extensive library of Masonic literature in addition to our beautifully made Masonic, Scottish Rite, Eastern Star and Shriners (to name just a few) regalia and jewelry. 






107 — The Ancient Building (Goose and Gridiron) in which the first Lodge in London met. Concise History, page 360.

Lord's Prayer From Chart, Size 22x28, in Colors





If you get a notice asking you to attend some important lodge meeting throw it to one side, and thus show that you have confidence in the officers of your Lodge.


Never bother to go to the funeral of a brother; the corpse won't miss you, and it isn't your funeral, anyway.

2015-Approach of Roman Army to Jerusalem. From Knights Templar History by Addison.




Tracing Board, Philosophical Degree





Brother Stanley C. Buz is doing a fund-raising project to benefit a Masonic Charity AND ALSO TO HONOR Past Masters who spend many years in the line to achieve the great honor of becoming a Past Master.

The Stein is 7-1/2 inches tall, 3-1/4 inches at the opening and 4-3/4 inches at the base. It is made of white Brazilian ceramic with a pewter lid that is 95% zinc and 5% pewter. On the top of the lid is the Holy bible in color. On the front of the stein is the Past Master symbol, which is in great detail and contains 22-carat gold for the compasses and the square. On the right hand side of the center decal are color images of the 10 items that are very significant and used in Freemasonry. On the left hand side of the center decal are the two pillars of Freemasonry with the altar and the great lights.

Above the altar is a verse by Matthew 7:7. On the bottom of the stein is a decal with the dedication to William Mumpower, Jr. and George Spillman, another dedicated Masonic Brother.

### PHILA MASONICA CLUB der Forschungsloge Quatuor Coronati Wien

1974 wurde die Forschungsloge Quatuor Coronati Wien gegründet. Das Ziel dieser Deputationsloge ist, durch das Studium der freimaurerischen Geschichte (und besonders der österreichischen Freimaurergeschichte) ein tiefes Verständnis für die Freimaurerei zu erarbeiten. Das Ergebnis wird in den Quatuor-Coronati-Berichten (derzeit Heft Nr. 22) festgeschrieben.

1989 wurde im Rahmen der Quatuor Coronati Wien der Phila Masonica Club (PMC) gegründet, der sich mit dem Gebiet der maurerischen Philatelie beschäftigt. Die-Briefmarkenclub, einer der vielen in Europa und Übersee, hat sich, neben der Sammlung von Briefmarken maurerischer Persönlichkeiten und Briefmarken mit maurerischen Symbolen, zur Aufgabe gemacht, die freimaurerischen Ereignisse der Großloge von Österreich postalisch zu dokumentieren, 51 FDC und Gedenkkuverts sind bis dato (2003) zur Ausgabe gelangt. Zwangsläufig ergibt sich auch ein reger Schriftverkehr mit den anderen maurerischen "Stamp Clubs".

## PHILA MASONICA CLUB of the Resarch Lodge Quatuor Coronati Wien




