American Topical Association Offers 101 New Stamp Checklists

It was reported in a recent issue of *Linn's Stamp News* that in 2003 the American Topical Association upgraded or added a total of 101 stamp checklists on a wide variety of topics for collectors.

The checklists range in scope and topic from a one-page checklist on the Battle of the Bulge to a new 48-page checklist of saints on stamps. The current listing of 423 subjects covers the full spectrum of topical collecting. Karen Carter, the new service director of checklists for the ATA said, as reported in *Linn's*, "Anyone who is interested in getting into a topical area of philately should take a good look at the checklists that are now available. Many experienced collectors have put in a lot of time in creating these lists and have donated them to the American Topical Association to help other topicalists enjoy their hobby."

Among the newer lists are some that encompass the topicals listed as the most collected by members of the ATA. "Bananas" and "Botanical Gardens" fall within the most popular topic of 2003, "Plants on Stamps."

Lists for Crocodiles, Dinosaurs, Donkeys, Lizards, Pigs, Snakes, Turtles, and Wildlife Conservation represent the second most popular topic, "Animals."

Sports, at number three, has new listings on Golf, Ice Hockey, Volleyball and Windsurfing. The revised River Rafting list represents the fourth most popular topic - "Watercraft and Ships."

Rounding out the top five topics is "Birds on Stamps," for which new or revised checklists are now available on Flamingoes, Ostriches, the Phoenix, and Puffins.

A free listing of all 423 checklists is available to any interested person who sends an addressed, stamped, Number 10 envelope (SASE) to the American Topical Association, Box 57, Arlington, TX 76004-6057. Information on membership in the American Topical Association will accompany the listing of checklists.

The American Topical Association seeks additional lists or updates from collectors at large which brings me to the real purpose I have written up this item for *The Masonic Philutelist*!

Thanks to the ATA and the efforts of Christopher L. Murphy we have produced two ATA Handbooks of interest to Masons. ATA Handbook No 141 *Masonic Philately* and Handbook Number 145 *Masonic Government Issues to 2003*. Both are computer based so that copies can be printed as needed and corrections and updates made as they come to the attention of the author. Notices on these Handbooks appear in this issue of the Masonic Philatelist and we encourage our members to purchase copies from the American Topical Society.

Checklists are another story. To my knowledge there are no Masonic checklists available from the ATA. How can this be with the wide variety of Masonic topics collected?

Can we get together and produce some checklists under the Masonic banner for the American Topical Association? There are a number of checklists that can be produced under the Masonic topic; Masons on United States of America Stamps, Masons on Canadian Stamps, Masonic Symbols on Stamps, Masonic Buildings on Stamps, Masons on French Stamps, Masons on British Stamps, Masonic Cancellations, and more.

No doubt some of these Masonic Checklists already exist! Produced by our Masonic Club members! Please don't hide your light under a basket. 

Enclosed is a copy of a recent Newsletter about the efforts of the Grand Lodge of Alaska to rekindle the light of Freemasonry in Eastern Russia.

This project was started in 1993 and is steadily making progress. We have found the Russian families receptive to our efforts.

Brother Vyacheslav "Slava" Dokuchaeva, treasurer of Pacific Rim Lodge in Vladivostok, was killed in a plane crash. A Masonic buckle that he was wearing identified him.

Mrs. Lyuda Dokuchaeva wrote me as follows:

"I know Slava was only the beginner to Masonry, but he wanted to become a real Mason and indeed he was a real Mason in his soul and he was proud of it."

Masonry can and does make a difference.

The Worshipful Masters of the two new Russian lodges, east of the Ural Mountains, were initiated in the United States. One was initiated in Alaska and one in Missouri. They returned home to develop Pacific Rim Lodge #12, Vladivostok and Alpha & Omega Lodge #23, Novosibirsk.

Our Russian Relations committee hopes that you will find the enclosed material of interest. If additional information is desired please do not hesitate to let me know. Photos can be supplied if an item for your journal is considered.



Pacific Rim Lodge #567 in Long Beach, California wrote that they would like to send something to Pacific Rim Lodge #12 in Vladivostok. They asked what would the Russian Lodge desire? The answer was "An American Flag".

An American flag was subsequently donated by the California lodge.

Only by enlightening the public about the purposes and principles and dispelling their misconceptions will Freemasonry be able to be accepted in Eastern Russia.

Secretary "Slava" Voitenko wrote: "We initiated new brother Mike Bounakov. He is attorney. Another new Mason in photo is Phillip Rader from Germany. He is an apprentice and has a probation in Russia in Irkutz, Vladivostok and Moscow and later in China. He has interest in Russian Masonry and writes the articles in German newspaper. We have the plan to initiate also two new apprentices in near future. One is a doctor."

Alpha & Omega Lodge #23, Novosibirsk

Feb 7, 2003 – WM Sergei reported that the lodge Secretary and Junior Warden attended Grand Lodge in Moscow. They reported A&O Lodge was "especially noted for its progress in the right direction and for the charitable CPR training program."

The Russian Relations Committee supported by Lifetime membership fees, sent A&O Lodge two payments of \$800 so they could rent a place to initiate new candidates.

WM Sergei wrote: "I am happy to inform you about degree work we performed in the new apartment we rented for the lodge.

"Egor Savin was initiated. We have done pretty good job. It was even better than degree work accomplished for our lodge last summer in the hotel by brothers from Grand Lodge of Russia. It is because we had a very secure place and nobody disturbed us. Plus we had only one candidate and for 1st degree only. So we were doing the job very carefully.

"All members report sense of awe and excitement. I told them that the ritual was designed to steer these feelings in Brothers.

"There is a part of 1[#] degree work where candidates are formerly tested by fire. Sorry, but I literally burned his breast hair. Poor guy, but no complaints."

"February 2003 – I have the feeling that you have strong support from Masonic Brothers in your desire to establish real light in Siberta. I have legal right to buy flat but at this point we need to be more prudent in spending funds. My point is that the spending must be spent in effectively as possible. Let's start with flat renting for some months or half of a year and see what progress we have. I don't want even one dollar spent without tangible benefits for the craft. Yours Fraternally, Sergei."

"September 2003 – My job required short visit to Moscow. I just returned home. Grand Lodge is obviously happy with our work.

"On my flight back one of the passengers had severe heart attack. The crew asked if there are MDs on the board. There were some MDs, but they were pretty shy. I offered my help and used my CPR skills plus some medication that were on board. Luckily the guy gradually returned consciousness and J was invited to the cabin to talk to the captain. He asked me if we need emergency landing. I told him it is practical and we better fly to Novosibirsk where ambulance should be waiing for the patient.

"They accepted my advice. I was promoted to the first class seat and received delicious meals. The crew and the passengers showed their appreciation."

"September 2003 - So good to hear from you. I have paid the rent because the situation was urgent. We were in desperate need to have place to meet with Alexandr Felker from Tomsk, the city 400 miles from Novosibirsk. We had several meetings. Initiated him 1st degree and have done some ritual training for him including opening and closing the lodge; so it was a historical event. We are spreading the Fraternity beyond our city limits. - WM Sergei Bogolepov, Alpha & Omega Lodge #23. April 2004 – Alpha & Omega Lodge #23 is still experiencing problems finding an affordable place to meet.

Our committee would like eventually to challenge the members of Novosibirsk to match a grant to purchase a building to be used as a lodge hall. But this will have to wait for a later date.




